1949 Cap. 177. A LAW TO PREVENT THE UNAUTHORISED USE OF UNIFORMS.

[6th November, 1936.]

Short title.

1. This Law may be cited as the Unauthorized Uniforms Law.

Interpretation. 2. In this Law—

"Her Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces" includes reserve and auxiliary forces;

"other uniform" means any distinctive dress which indicates or is intended to indicate or may be taken to indicate that the person wearing it belongs to, or is a member of, any political association, institution, organisation or party.

Wearing of uniform without permission prohibited. **3.** Any person who—

- (a) not being a person serving in Her Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces, wears or uses, without permission in writing from the Governor, any uniform authorised for use by Her Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces or any uniform so nearly resembling the same as to be likely to deceive; or
- (b) not being a person serving in the Cyprus Police Force, or other Department, wears or uses, without permission in writing from the Governor, any uniform authorised for use by the Cyprus Police Force or other Department or any uniform so nearly resembling the same as to be likely to deceive; or

(c) wears or uses, without permission in writing from the Governor, any other uniform,

shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: five pounds fine.

4. Any person who, not being a person serving in Her Bringing Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces or in the Cyprus contempt on Police Force, or other Department, wears the uniform of any of these Forces or Department, or any dress having the appearance or bearing any of the regimental or other distinctive marks of any such uniform, or any other uniform whatsoever, in such manner or in such circumstances as to be likely to bring contempt on that uniform, or employs any other person so to wear such uniform or dress, shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: three months imprisonment.

5. Where under this Law any act, if done without Burden on proof. lawful permission is an offence, the burden of proving that the act was done with lawful permission shall lie upon the person accused.

6. It shall be lawful for the Governor in granting any Power to permission under this Law to limit the area within which Governor to impose the uniform the subject of such permission may be worn, restrictions and generally to qualify such permission in such other $\frac{in}{permission}$. manner as he may think fit.

7. Nothing in this Law contained shall prevent—

- (a) any person from wearing or using any uniform in the course of a stage play performed in any place in which stage plays may lawfully be publicly performed or in the course of a music hall or circus performance or in the course of any bona fide naval, military or air force representation ; or
- (b) any person from wearing or using any uniform authorised by any other Law.
