QUARANTINE (DANGEROUS INFECTIOUS DISEASES) NOTICE 2010

The Administrator issues the following Notice in exercise of the power under section 3 of the Quarantine Ordinance(a).

Citation and commencement

1. This Notice may be cited as the Quarantine (Dangerous Infectious Diseases) Notice 2010 and comes into force on the day it is published in the Gazette.

- 1. This explanatory note relates to the Quarantine (Dangerous Infectious Diseases) Notice 2010. It has been prepared by the Office of the Attorney General and Legal Adviser in order to assist the reader of the Notice. It does not form part of the Notice.
- 2. By this Notice, the Administrator declares certain diseases to be "dangerous infectious diseases" for the purposes of the Quarantine Ordinance. It replaces the previous Notifications. The specified diseases mirror those in the equivalent Republican legislation, with the addition of scarlet fever.
