THE GAME AND WILD BIRDS
(PROTECTION AND DEVELOPMENT) ORDINANCE, 1974
(Ordinances 11 of 1974, 1 of 1982, 3 of 1985 and 9 of 1988).

ORDER MADE UNDER SECTION 6.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon me under Section 6 of the Game and Wild Birds (Protection and Development) Ordinance, 1974, I, the Acting Chief Officer, hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Game (Ceiling) Order, 1989.
2. The number of hares that may be shot or possessed by the holder of a game licence shall not on any one day exceed two.
3. The number of partridges that may be shot or possessed by the holder of a game licence shall not on any one day exceed five :

Provided that such holder may on any one day shoot or possess one francolin, but in such case the number of partridges that may be shot or possessed by such holder shall not on any one day exceed four.
4. Nothing in this Order shall apply to the possession of hares, partridges or francolin by any person who is entitled to possess such game under Section 11 of the Ordinance.
5. This Order covers the period between 12th November, 1989 and 31st December, 1989, inclusive.

ORDER MADE UNDER SECTION 7.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon me under Section 7 of the Game and Wild Birds (Protection and Development) Ordinance, 1974, I, the Acting Chief Officer, hereby fix that the shooting of game and wild birds shall during the non-close season take place between sunrise and sunset.

10 of 1972 and 10 of 1982).

**CONTROL AND MAXIMUM PRICE ORDER
MADE UNDER SECTIONS 3(1) AND 4(1).**

In exercise of the powers vested in him by subsection (1) of Sections 3 and 4 of the Commodities and Services (Regulation and Control) Ordinance, the Administrator hereby makes the following Order:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Commodities and Services (Maximum Price of Pork) Order, 1989.
2. Pork is hereby declared to be a controlled commodity for the purpose of the Ordinance.
3. The wholesale and retail prices at which pork may be sold or offered for sale in the Areas shall not exceed the maximum prices set out in the second and third columns respectively of the Schedule thereto.
4. Public Instrument No. 32 of 1985, in so far as it refers to live pigs and fresh pork, is hereby revoked.

Description of Controlled Commodity	Maximum Wholesale price	Maximum Retail price
Fresh pork : unslaughtered pig reared locally. Shoulder and/or ham and/or fillet and/or chops of carcass pork without fat.	£0.46½ per kilo. —	£1.15 per kilo : Provided that whenever the maximum wholesale price of the fresh meat of unslaughtered pig drops to less than 46½ c. per kilo, for every such decrease by 2 cents per kilo, as this shall be verified from the invoice issued by the pig-breeder or the trader of live pigs, the maximum retail price shall drop by 4 cents per kilo.”

**CONTROL AND MAXIMUM PRICE ORDER
MADE UNDER SECTIONS 3(1) AND 4(1).**

In exercise of the powers vested in him by subsection (1) of Sections 3 and 4 of the Commodities and Services (Regulation and Control) Ordinance, the Administrator hereby makes the following Order :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Commodities and Services (Maximum Price of Clay Bricks) Order, 1989.

2. Clay bricks are hereby declared to be a controlled commodity for the purpose of the Ordinance.

3. The retail price at which clay bricks may be sold or offered for sale in the Areas shall not exceed the maximum price set out in the third column of the Schedule thereto.

Fixed maximum prices.

Description of Controlled Commodity	Maximum Wholesale price	Maximum Retail price
Ordinary or frontage clay bricks of usual quality with rectangular or square perforations of 300 x 200 x 100 MM dimensions, in conformity with the Cyprus Standard CYS 19:1983—Specification for clay bricks.	—	£82.00 per thousand, piled up neatly on the motor-truck at the site of the factory.”.
